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The 3 CBS processes/movements

CBS begins with the reality, experience and resources of the community ... 'community-consciousness' = **people's theology**

In-between we re-read the Bible, slowly, carefully and closely using the critical resources of biblical scholarship ... `critical consciousness'

> Thematic-semiotic (in-front-of-text) Literary (on-text) Socio-historical (behind-text) Thematic-semiotic (in-front-of-text)

... and ends with the reality, experience and resources of the community ... 'community-consciousness' = **prophetic theology** SEE



SEE – JUDGE - ACT

- See
 - Adolescent girls and young women 15-24 years are at particularly high risk of HIV infection in Southern Africa, particularly in KwaZulu-Natal
 - This sector accounts for 25% of all new infections in Southern Africa
 - Girls and young women have a 3-4 fold higher HIV incidence rate than boys and young men
 - A key factor is that young women are engaging in age disparate sexual relationships with older men

RE-READING RUTH (AGAIN)

• Question 1: Using the art images of the story of Ruth, re-tell the story in your small groups.





- Question 2: Re-read Ruth 2:1-17 in small groups.
 - Who takes the initiative for their survival when they arrive in Naomi's context?
 - What does Ruth do to ensure they have food?
 - How do you understand Ruth's request in verse 7a?
- Question 3: In the relationship between Ruth and Boaz it seems that it is Boaz who first notices Ruth.
 - What do we know about Boaz?
 - How does Boaz find out who Ruth is?
 - What questions does Boaz ask about her?
 - What do you think his motives are when he asks about her, talks to her, and helps her?
- Question 4: How does Ruth respond to Boaz?
 - Why does she respond as she does in verse 10?
 - Is there a shift in her response to Boaz in verse 13?
 - What do you think her hopes and fears are as she engages with him?

Question 5: Re-read Ruth 3:1-18 in small groups.

- What is Naomi worried about in verse 1?
- What is Naomi's plan of action in verses 2-4?
- Why do you think Naomi encourages Ruth to have a sexual relationship with Boaz?

• Question 6: How does Ruth respond to Naomi?

- What is Ruth's immediate response to Naomi?
- What do you think her hopes and fears are as she walks towards the threshing floor at night?
- What kinds of concerns do you think Ruth has as she initiates a sexual relationship with Boaz?
- In what ways is Ruth vulnerable in her new context?

- Question 7: In what ways is the relationship between Boaz and Ruth a 'sugar daddy' or 'blesser' relationship?
- Question 8: What are the characteristics of a 'sugar daddy' and a 'blesser' relationship in your context?
- Question 9: What are the risks and what are the benefits for a young woman in a 'sugar daddy' or 'blesser' relationship?
- Question 10: What social and religious structures must we engage with in order to address the 'sugar daddy'/ 'blesser' situation? What from your perspective needs to change?

- Where do we work with this CBS?
- How do we work with it?
 - With young women?
 - With older men?
 - With the church?
- Praxis: Action-reflection-action-reflection
- This CBS is not static; it changes shape as we understand the realities more clearly, led by young women in the communities we work with.
