Historical Background

- □ The Institute for the Study of the Bible (ISB) was formed in 1989 by Prof Gunther Wittenberg based on his experience of the Centro de Estudos Biblicos (CEBI)
- Wittenberg placed his scholarship at the service of the poor and oppressed, the 'epistemological privildge of the poor'
- This concept inspired the work of Prof GO West on Contextual Bible Study (CBS) and reading the Bible with ordinary readers of the poor and the oppressed communities

- The Institute for the Study of the Bible merged with Worker Ministry Project under the leadership of Mzwandile Roddy Nunes in 1998
- The ISB-Worker Ministry became Ujamaa Centre for Community Development and Research in 2004
- Ujamaa Centre has been doing Contextual Bible Study (CBS) for 25 years

- Reflect critically from a religious perspective on public life, governance and democratic processes (theological)






Bread theology:

Body theology:

- Critically engages with the area of HIV, sexuality, gender, disability and masculinity (ideological)
- Reflect critically from a religious perspective on issues of sexuality and the Bible (theological)

Body Theology



Earth theology"

- Critically engages with the African understanding (culture) of climate change and the environment (ideological)
- Reflect critically from a religious perspective on climate change, land and the environment (theological)

Earth Theology



People's theology:

- Critically engages with the dominant traditions and practices within social movements (ideological)
- Reflect critically from a religious perspective on 'theologies from below' (theological)
